Elliott House feeds hungry OLLU Faculty

Jacqueline Walter sat in her office chair, took a deep breath and with watery eyes, continued to talk about her experience with Loaves and Fishes.

"It's sad to hear that they're hungry, but it's also good that we could feed them," she said, referring to the students who face hunger during finals week due to lack of funds in their meal plans or other personal reasons. "I know it's stressful and we want to help."

For two consecutive semesters, Elliott House has hosted Loaves and Fishes - or "Brain Food" - a collective effort to feed hungry students during finals week, even if only with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. This semester, Loaves and Fishes will be held Dec. 10-13.

Vice President of University Mission and Ministry Gloria Urrabazo began the food haven after a student went into Elliott House and said she was hungry. The student was fed with what was available in the kitchen.

"Our response is out of need,"

Urrabazo said. "It's how this institution started - out of a need."

Since then, Urrabazo and the different units in Elliott House have made sure to always have at least peanut butter, loaves of bread and drinks in the kitchen for hungry students. More effort is put into the meals provided to students during finals week, though.

Already, other campus organizations, faculty and students have begun donating food for the busy week ahead.


Walter, program coordinator for the Center for Women in Church and Society, said that an alumnus has already committed to donate as many as 150 breakfast tacos.

Both times Loaves and Fishes has been held, the Elliott House Kitchen never ran out of food - instead, the food multiplied. Urrabazo said that this is the reason for its name.

In the Bible, Jesus feeds a multitude of over 5,000 people with only five fish and two loaves of bread, even having food left over after everyone is fed.

"You work with what you have," she said.

Although there is a dining room



"We share food," said Walter, a University alumnus who began working with the Center for Women in October of 2011 - the semester Loaves and Fishes started. "But we also share in the life of the student."

"It's just our way of supporting students to do well in their exams," Urrabazo said. "People do better when they're well fed "

Urrabazo said that students have asked the staff at Elliott House why it is that they feed them and that Walter's response moved a male student to tears last semester.

"Because we care about you," Walter had said. "Because we love you."

Loaves and Fishes will be held from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Thursday of finals week (Dec. 10-13) at Elliott House kitchen.


Pictures with Santa were also offered in the Mall Area.

The events ended after 1 a.m.




Delta Xi Nu sisters (above) hold an annual secret Santa gift exchange. The sisters exchange their gifts annualy during Midnight Breakfast.

Vanessa Arce, senior and business management major, would let Cristiano Ronaldo survive.



Student's past influences present activism

Tyler Tully didn't become the leader of the student movement known as the 12 or Doce overnight—even though it appeared that way via the Internet.

Tully, a Religious Studies major, has been everywhere this semester. Whether it's rallying for Doce support online or organizing students for vigils, Tully's name is everywhere the 12 is.

What never came up in his Doce emails and online responses was how Tully, a non-traditional senior graduating this spring, got to where he is today.

While Tully, 32, and his fellow Doces have the gratitude of CDPs, faculty and students, Tully said everything he has done was inspired by what was instilled in him during courses at OLLU.

"Theology is an action," Tully said. "You don't get anything done by just thinking about it all day."

The experiences that have shaped Tully, however, go beyond this small campus. Originally from Oklahoma City, Tully said he grew up in an extremely conservative environment where everyone believed in the same things.

"When I was younger, I had stereotyped Hispanics," Tully said. The environment he grew up in was narrow-minded.

"Wherever you grow up, you grow with blinders," he added.

The exclusiveness of where he grew up wasn't comfortable with outsiders, Tully said. However, after going to college and being exposed to diversity, Tully learned otherwise.

"The mindset's like, you stay here, you live here, you die here," Tully said. "I look back and see how immature I was."

Jane Grovijahn, professor of

Religious Studies and Theology, had Tully for four classes within the past two years and has observed Tully's ability to draw from his experiences and relate them to religious studies.

"He has always shown compassion for social justice," Grovijahn said.

"I deeply admire his leadership," she added.

At the beginning of the 12, Tully reached out to students, faculty and alumni—a quality that isn't seen by most, Grovijahn said.

Tully's outreach to the entire OLLU community for the 12 is similar to what Martin Luther King and Cesar Chavez did, Grovijahn said. When people remember social justice, their names always come up—but never the community that helped them, Grovijahn added.

Tully attended the University

of Central Oklahoma and majored in political science with a minor in communications. While at UCO, Tully said he held several leadership positions like the President of the Student Body.

Religious studies and political science go hand in hand, Grovijahn said. Political science focuses on responsibility while religious studies asks what it means to be human—the combination of the two creates a concern for social justice.

Tully also worked for the George W. Bush re-election campaign as well as several other political campaigns.

However, in 2005, Tully started feeling the emptiness in the campaigns he was working on. He said it's similar to the way that people tell themselves something over and over again to convince themselves of its truth.

"Why was I campaigning for [Bush]?" Tully asked. "We never found weapons of mass destruction. We were lied to."

This type of miscommunication based on power is one of the many habits in politics Tully observed that brought him to Religious Studies.

Tully also started a real estate business and left after some years to finish his degree. Corey Calvino, a senior graduating in spring, recommended he check out OLLU, so he stayed and changed his area of focus.

While at OLLU, Tully learned the importance of community—especially through Liberal Arts.

"They're all interactive," Tully said. "These skills aren't just for me. Faculty doesn't teach to get rich. They teach to impart knowledge."

While skills Tully learned with political campaigns helped with Doce, he said he is never going to do campaign work again. The six months of strenuous work would break anybody, so to unwind from the chaos, Tully and some "campaign buddies" would travel.

So far, Tully has traveled to the Netherlands, Belgium, Germany, Italy, England, Ireland, France, Japan and Peru due to hectic campaigns, his wife and school.

Because his wife is an infectious disease doctor in the air force, they travel frequently. This is how they ended up in Texas.

"The commonality [between me and my wife] is faith," Tully said. "Faith and acting on it." This summer, it is highly possible the couple will go to Peru so his wife can do research on tropical diseases, Tully said. While describing his previous trip to Peru last summer, Tully's eyes lit up when remembering the people.

"I didn't know the real world until I went to Lima," he said.

Texas provides many more opportunities than Oklahoma—and most other places—because of its diversity, Tully added.

He participates in the San Antonio Gaelic football team, which is an Irish version of the game that looks like a mix of soccer and rugby.

"The team looks like San Antonio," Tully said. "It's so diverse."

Tully said he wants to pursue a Ph.D. and teach at the collegiate level. But first he must attain his Masters, which he plans to pursue in

Tully's ability to draw from experience and act on what he believes in is something that makes him stand out, Grovijahn said.

Jorge Valadez, Philosophy professor and chair of the department, also noticed this skill in Tully.

"He has a good way of expressing disagreement and giving others the benefit of the doubt," Valadez said.

While Tully has not taken any of Valadez's classes, he has impressed Valadez with his insight in Socrates Café, a discussion group hosted by the philosophy department.

"I expect him to continue to have an impact on issues that affect the community, society and university," Valadez said. "I expect great things from him."



Soccer season ends in success for both teams

Hours of practicing on the field every day have paid off for the Saints soccer teams.

The men's team competed for the first time in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament.

The women made it fourth in conference and lost in the semifinals of the conference tournament, which made their regular season record 9-9-1 and their conference record 6-3-1.

The men had one of their best seasons in history this 2012 season, dominating the Red River Athletic Conference. They advanced to compete in national competition in California and finished with a regular season record of 12-8-1 and a conference record of 9-2.

"Both teams have been successful due to their maturity," said Shane Hurley, head coach for men's and women's soccer. "We have demanded quite a bit from them. For the most part, the vast majority are moving in the right direction in all areas."

"Our team had really great chemistry," said senior Abby DuLaney, Women's Soccer captain. "This season wasn't one of our greatest, but if we continue to play with confidence we can do better."

The women's team did not advance to compete in the national level but did qualify for the Red River Athletic conference for the fourth consecutive year.
